- ▶ **Spotlight**
 - The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation released its 2026 Request for Proposals for the Longleaf Landscape Stewardship Fund. This funding supports projects that advance longleaf pine restoration to benefit wildlife, improve water quality, sequester carbon, and enhance forest resilience.  - SERDP-ESTCP released the Impacts of Ecosystem Transformation on Testing and Training Lands Statement of Need that seeks to advance understanding of how recent, ongoing, or potential ecosystem transformations may affect Department of War (DoW) mission fulfillment and operations, both directly and indirectly, and how management actions might mitigate these impacts. Ecosystem transformations occur when historical ecosystems are replaced by others with contrasting properties, driven by factors such as invasive species, altered fire regimes, severe weather, and other disturbances. - The Economic Development Administration (EDA) FY 2025 Disaster Notice of Funding Opportunity is now available. The EDA Disaster Supplemental Grant Program makes approximately \$1.45 billion in disaster recovery funding available to American communities that received major disaster declarations due to hurricanes, wildfires, severe storms and flooding, tornadoes, and other natural disasters occurring in calendar years 2023 and 2024. Readiness and Implementation of grant applications will be accepted and reviewed on an ongoing (rolling) basis until funds are exhausted, or the Notice of Funding Opportunity is canceled. Industry Transformation grant applications are due on **Tuesday, March 3, 2026, at 5 p.m. Eastern Time**. - The National Forest Foundation's 2026 Matching Award Program (MAP) is now open for applications. This program funds projects that benefit U.S. National Forests and Grasslands by matching federal dollars with a 1:1 nonfederal contribution. Priority is given to projects involving community engagement, stewardship, and lasting benefits for communities connected to National Forest System lands. Eligible applicants include nonprofits, Tribal governments, and universities. Projects must occur on or adjacent to National Forest or Grasslands, last no more than 18 months, and start in May or June 2026. **Applications are due January 22, 2026**. - The Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Parks and Open Space Florida Forever Grant Program opened the 2025-26 grant submission cycle. The grant program provides funding to local governments and eligible nonprofit environmental organizations for acquiring community-based parks, open spaces, and greenways that support outdoor recreation and natural resource protection goals outlined in local comprehensive plans. It helps local government leverage state dollars to maximize conservation benefits and promote public-private partnerships and land acquisition initiatives. **Applications are due January 19, 2026**. - The Pee Dee Basin Initiative, a multi-agency partnership, will permanently conserve more than 62,000 acres of forestland, the largest conservation easement in South Carolina's history. The conservation easement protects vital habitat for at least 115 plant and animal species, including migratory birds, rare mussels, and Atlantic and shortnose sturgeon. It also preserves 30,000 acres of bottomland hardwoods that absorb floodwater and buffer communities from severe weather events. - The Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians is working with the National Indian Carbon Coalition to increase carbon sequestration and forest health for over two-thirds of their tribal lands. With overflowing classrooms and crumbling facilities, the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians is using revenue from carbon sales to build a state-of-the-art high school which meets the community's needs. ► Sentinel Landscapes

- The Sentinel Landscapes Landowner Resources Tool (LRT) is now available. The LRT aggregates landowner assistance programs offered in the states where Sentinel Landscapes operate, including cost-share opportunities, conservation easements, grants, loans, technical assistance, tax incentives, and more. - The Big Bend Coastal Conservancy in northwest Florida has put forth a proposition for a unified UNESCO World Heritage Site that frames the Florida Big Bend as a single, interconnected cultural landscape and natural system of outstanding value that merits international recognition and long-term protection. Florida's Big Bend is a vast area of locations with archaeological, cultural, ecological and geological significance. - The State of Florida approved an investment of \$27.4 million to protect over 21,500 acres of [conservation](#) and agricultural lands across the state. The land will be placed under a conservation easement and will provide a critical buffer for key military installations while protecting water quality and aquifer recharge in the Perdido and Escambia river watersheds. The property lies within the Northwest Florida Sentinel Landscape and Florida Wildlife Corridor. The acquisitions will strengthen Florida's conservation network, support military readiness through Sentinel Landscapes, and preserve family-owned agricultural lands, ensuring the state's natural and rural landscapes remain intact for future generations. - The Conservation Fund announced the successful completion of the Stateline Forest conservation project, a multi-state land protection effort safeguarding 10,345 acres of land and nearly 45 miles of critical waterways, conserving the longleaf pine ecosystem along the Alabama-Georgia state line. The acquisition also preserves public access to natural lands, enhancing recreational opportunities, bolstering wildfire resilience near the rapidly developing Atlanta region, and advancing sustainable land management in the Dugdown Corridor of Georgia. The property will be state-owned and managed by the Alabama Forestry Commission and the Georgia Department of Natural Resources. ► **At-Risk, Threatened, and Endangered Species**

- *Quail Call* is Tall Timbers' annual publication highlighting the work of the Game Bird Program. It provides updates on current research projects and initiatives, wild bobwhite quail hatch reports, feature stories from their biologists, and news on regional programs and research efforts across the Southeast. - Tall Timbers' Central Florida Rangeland Quail Program is known for its intensive bobwhite management, but its prescribed fire practices also benefit rare species. During an October survey at Escape Ranch, Tall Timbers staff and volunteers discovered 41 Berry's skipper butterflies, a rare Florida species, while observing 45 butterfly species and 819 individuals overall. The fire regime, which creates a mosaic of burned and unburned units, promotes healthy, diverse populations in Central Florida prairies. Escape Ranch's commitment to maintaining large, contiguous areas of native ground cover with minimal invasive plants has resulted in the largest known population of Berry's skipper in Florida. ► Southeast Prescribed Fire Initiative

- The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released new policy guidance to eliminate regulatory obstacles to prescribed burning. Regional offices are directed to collaborate with state, local, Tribal, and federal partners to revise State Implementation Plans (SIPs) so that they support strategic fire use. The guidance recognizes prescribed fire as critical for reducing catastrophic wildfire risk and allows it to be classified as an “exceptional event” under the Clean Air Act, providing air quality flexibility in fire-adapted regions. For the Southeast, this policy aligns air-quality regulations with ecological fire needs, enabling safer, more effective burns and reinforcing prescribed fire as a cornerstone of wildfire resilience and ecosystem health. Established in 2010, FSEN is a science delivery organization comprising 15 regional fire science exchanges across the U.S. These exchanges provide timely, relevant wildland fire science to federal, state, local, Tribal, academic, non-profit, and private stakeholders. By fostering collaboration among fire managers, practitioners, and scientists, FSEN ensures science is directly applicable to real-time decision-making. Funded by the Joint Fire Science Program, the network reports annual accomplishments by activities, organizational participation, and societal impact stories. - State forestry agencies across the Southeast are mobilizing under the Southeastern Interstate Forest Fire Protection Compact to support the North Carolina Forest Service as it braces for elevated wildfire risk following Hurricane Helene and the resulting heavy fuel loads. The GulfCorps represents a powerful approach to improving landscape resilience through a community-led restoration approach that recognizes workforce development as a long-term strategy for advancing better futures for our lands, waters, and communities. ► **Military Services News**

- The historic ocean liner, the SS United States, is set to become the world's largest artificial reef after it is sunk off the Florida Gulf Coast early next year. Okaloosa County officials announced that they expect to sink the SS United States about 22 nautical miles southwest of Destin and 32 nautical miles southeast of Pensacola. The nearly 1,000-foot vessel, which shattered the trans-Atlantic speed record on its maiden voyage in 1952, has spent most of this year at the Port of Mobile in Alabama being scoured to remove chemicals, wiring, plastic, and glass. The ship's final location was selected as part of an agreement with Pensacola tourism officials, who are contributing \$1.5 million to the project, and Coastal Conservation Association Florida. The contributions will be used to transform the SS United States into an artificial reef and finance a multiyear marketing campaign. The deal is part of Okaloosa County's \$10.1 million plan to purchase, move, clean, and sink the ship, which includes \$1 million toward an onshore museum to promote the ship's history.
